About Robert M. Edsel

Robert Edsel is recognized as one of the world's foremost advocates for art preservation and the recovery of cultural treasures missing since World War II. The last twenty years of his life have been dedicated to the meticulous research of the Monuments Men and Women, the soldier-scholars who helped save so many of the world's great art and cultural treasures from the destruction of war and theft by the Nazis. In the course of his work, Mr. Edsel has located and interviewed twenty-one Monuments Officers including three Monuments Women, and dozens of family members. Previously, Mr. Edsel had a successful sixteen-year career as Founder and Chairman of Gemini Exploration, an oil and gas exploration company that pioneered the use of horizontal drilling technology in the early 1990's.

More recently, Mr. Edsel has spent the past eight years researching and writing a new book that is a departure from his previous work. *Remember Us: American Sacrifice, Dutch Freedom, and A Forever Promise Forged in World War II*, is another sweeping untold story about freedom, love, and eternal gratitude. It will be published in April 2025, to coincide with the 80th anniversary of the end of the war in Europe.

Mr. Edsel is a #1 New York Times best-selling author of five non-fiction books, Rescuing Da Vinci, The Monuments Men, Saving Italy, The Greatest Treasure Hunt in History: The Story of the Monuments Men, his first book written for young readers, and the soon-to-be released Remember Us. Academy Award recipient George Clooney wrote, directed and starred in a film based on Edsel's second book, The Monuments Men, helping raise worldwide awareness of these heroes of civilization. The film, which was released in 2014 in more than 100 countries, included acclaimed actors Matt Damon, Cate Blanchett, and Bill Murray among others. Edsel is also the co-producer of the Emmy-nominated documentary film, The Rape of Europa.

Mr. Edsel is the Founder and Chairman of the nonprofit organization, the Monuments Men and Women Foundation, recipient of the National Humanities Medal, our nation's highest honor for work in the humanities, which was presented by President Bush at the White House in 2007. Among his many honors, Edsel has been awarded the "Texas Medal of Arts" Award; the "President's Call to Service" Award; the "Hope for Humanity" Award, presented by the Dallas Holocaust Museum; the "Distinguished Alumnus Award" from his alma mater, St. Mark's School of Texas; and the "Lifetime Achievement Award" from the National Council for the Promotion of the Italian Language in American Schools.

In November 2014, the Foundation for the National Archives presented Edsel with its "Records of Achievement Award," which recognizes an individual whose work has fostered a broader national awareness of the history and identity of the United States through the use of original records. Previous recipients have included Tom Brokaw, Ken Burns, David McCullough, Steven Spielberg, and Tom Hanks.

In 2015, Mr. Edsel received the "Anne Frank Human *Writes*" Award for his exceptional leadership in combating the sort of intolerance, prejudice and injustice that Anne Frank endured.

On October 22, 2015, following years of advocacy to honor these heroes of civilization, Mr. Edsel participated alongside Speaker of the House John Boehner, and Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, in the presentation of the Congressional Gold Medal to the Monuments Men and Women, our nation's highest civilian award.

Since 2016, Edsel has donated his time to meet with men and women serving in the U.S. Army Civil Affairs Division, who today perform many of the duties of the Monuments Men of World War II. In addition to attending briefings, he has delivered pro-bono presentations on base at Ft. Meade, Maryland and Ft. McCoy, Wisconsin.

In 2017, Mr. Edsel was recognized as an Honorary Member of the U.S. Army 88th Infantry Division.

In 2019, the government of Italy awarded Mr. Edsel the "Pio Alferano Award" in recognition of his work promoting and safeguarding historical and archaeological heritage.

In 2021, the government of Poland awarded Mr. Edsel the "Decoration of Honor Meritorious for Polish Culture" for his distinguished contributions to Polish culture and heritage.

In 2022, the United States Army and the Smithsonian Institution made Mr. Edsel an honorary graduate of the very first Army Monuments Officer Training Program, an idea Mr. Edsel advocated and championed for nearly twenty years.

In 2023, the National WW2 Museum dedicated its Liberation Pavilion, which included the Monuments Men and Women Gallery, the first permanent exhibit in the world to honor the legacy of these heroes. Mr. Edsel not only presented the idea, he worked closely with the museum's designers on the gallery writing the storyboards and selecting the works of art and personal artifacts on display.
